## Filtering SPAM in MS Outlook

### Purpose

This handout describes how to filter / block unwanted Email messages in MS Outlook.

Currently, 85% of email throughout the world is unwanted and commonly called SPAM. AT SASD district we utilize MS Exchange on our server with a product aimed at blocking most SPAM. Here is a sample of the stats as of this date:

Please note that of the 284,346 messages received from the Internet, the SPAM product blocked/purged 199,788 for a percent filter/block rate of @ 70%.

Our SPAM server receives updates throughout the day of new email SPAMS that it needs to block. No SPAM product is perfect and some SPAM does get through – these items may be blocked using this procedure.

### When should I do this?

You should filter / block an email if it is something suspicious or unsolicited. For example, the following Email is a sample SPAM that should be blocked:

## Hey Miriam Check Out This Watch

Clarice [gwfdzgfprv@metroelectricsupply.com]

To: tlscj@npacc.net

---

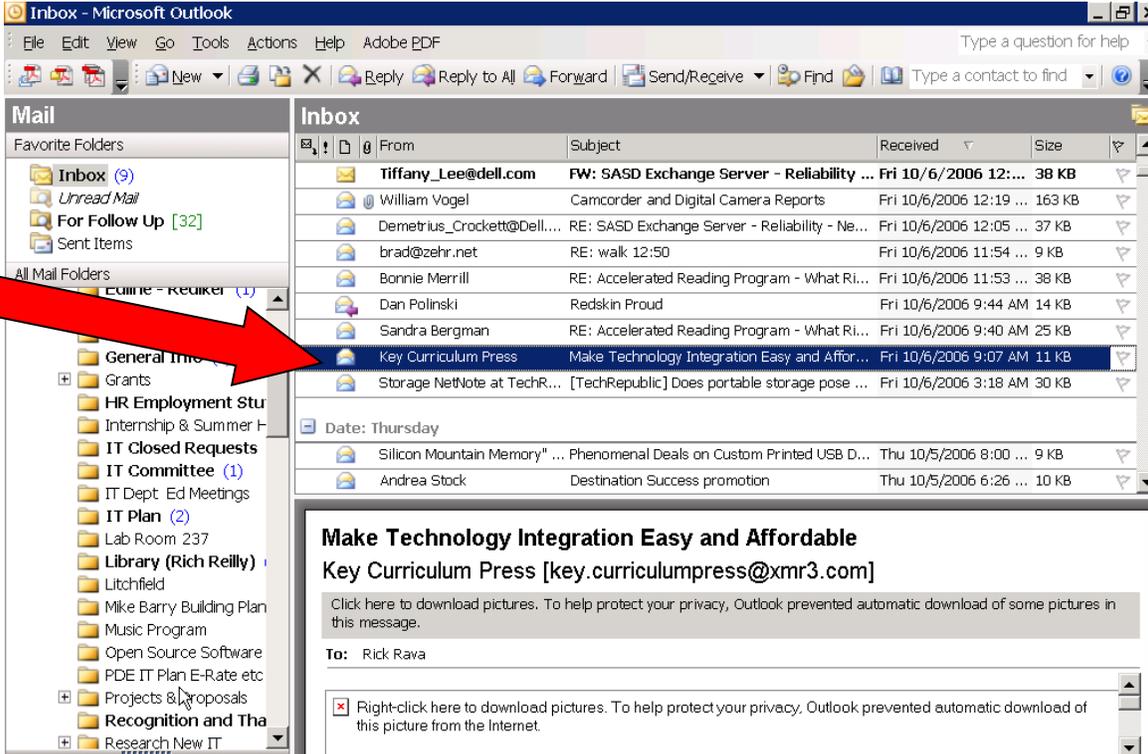

The SPAMMERS are getting quite creative – this one states that it is coming from the System Administrator and notes that the email could not reach some or all of its recipients – looks like an official email but it is SPAM.

## How do I block this SPAM?

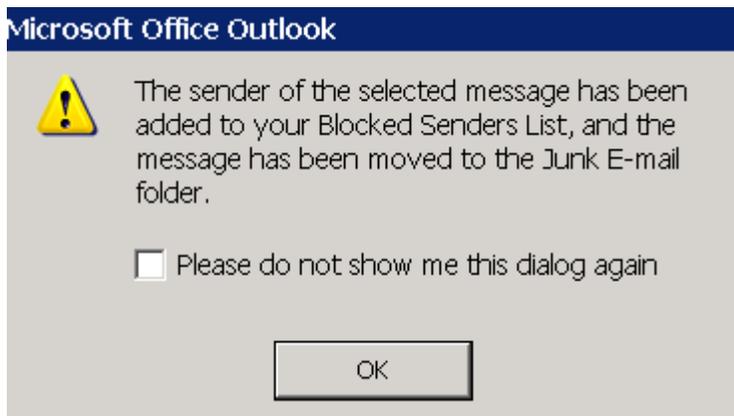
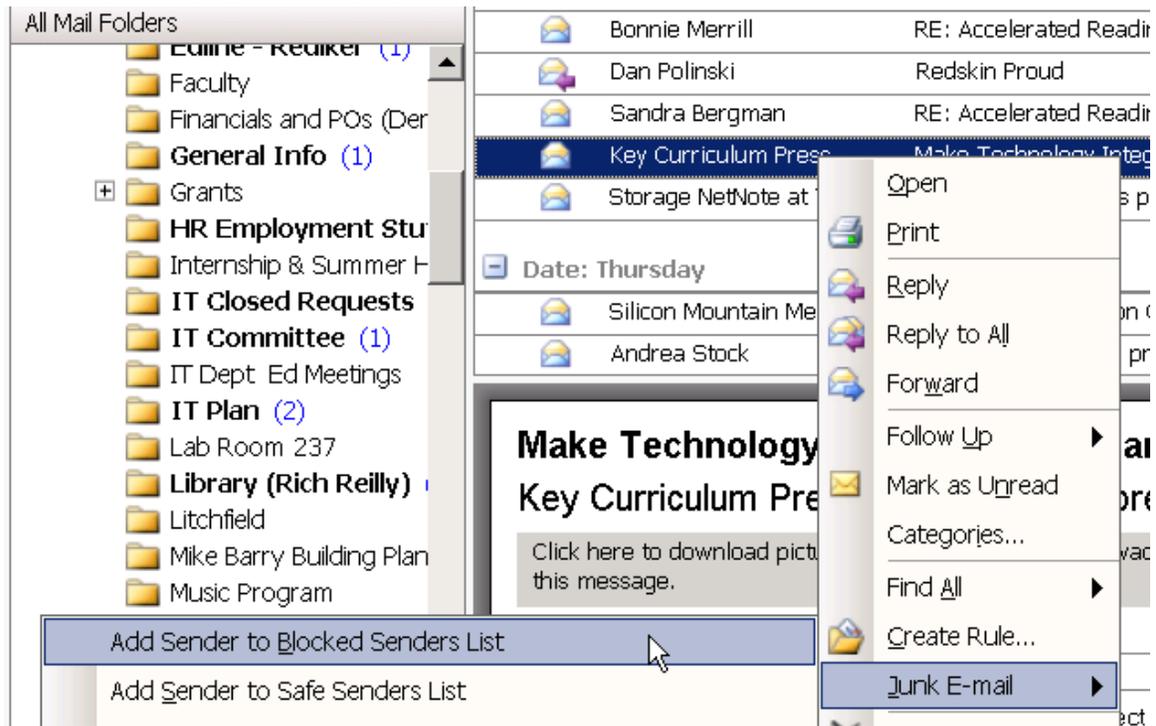
Start up MS Outlook on your PC.

Navigate to the email that is SPAM – in the following example, I have received an email from a company that I have never contacted and no longer wish to receive any emails from them.

Right mouse click on the email – then select Junk Email – then select Add Sender to Blocked Sender List
